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## The Importance of Fine Motor Skills

Welcome to Big Skills for Little Hands: I Can Trace! This hands-on activity book is an introduction to tracing skills. The act of tracing lines and shapes helps a child develop fine motor skills and hand-eye coordination. Fine motor skills are movements or activities that are produced by small muscles or muscle groups. Children in preschool spend a lot of their day developing these muscles in their hands. Developed motor skills are the key to success in kindergarten.

Developing fine motor skills is also an important part of brain development. Movement helps the organization of the brain. It reinforces growth and builds connections between different parts of the brain. More connections mean more brain power!

Fine motor skills are essential to developing the coordination, hand strength, and brain power needed to write, cut, button, zip, and eventually read. Finger plays, turning pages in books, screwing lids on and off jars, hammering nails, molding dough, sorting, pouring, and building with blocks are all examples of fine motor activities. These play experiences also develop dexterity, strength, hand-eye coordination, and visual discrimination.


Arts and crafts are a great way to enhance your child's fine motor skills. Not only are your child's little fingers bending, twisting, pinching, and pulling, they are also engaged in color, texture, and a variety of crafting mediums. The activities in this book are specifically structured to address your child's growing fine motor skills. There are parent instructions and tips on each page to guide you as you work through this book with your child. Remove each page from the book before your child begins working on it. Then, separate the activity section from the directions by cutting along the solid line.

You can save your child's completed tracing activities in a shoebox that he or she decorated. Your child can use them later for play or for arts and crafts. Enjoy working through this book with your child. The time you invest in your child's development is priceless and will reap countless rewards for years to come!

## Using Writing Tools

Big Skills for Little Hands: I Can Trace! teaches your child prewriting skills through playful tracing activities. Prewriting skills are essential for kindergarten success and include tracing lines in left to right, top to bottom, and circular movements. The activities help develop hand-eye coordination and teach numbers and shapes. All the activities build toward teaching proper letter formation.

One of the major standards of the preschool curriculum is learning to hold a pencil correctly and use it skillfully. As his or her fine motor skills develop, your child will advance from a tight-fisted grip to a proper grip, where he or she will
 hold the writing utensil between his or her thumb and fingers. To teach your child to maintain the proper hand position, remind him or her to "pinch" the writing utensil and let it rest on the third finger. You should model a proper grip and explain it using terms that your child will understand.

During this important developmental period, your child will learn which hand he or she prefers for writing, eating, throwing, etc. At this stage, children may switch hand preference daily. Allow your child to experiment with using either hand. To help your child gain confidence, allow many opportunities for him or her to color, write, and draw. As your child works, let him or her experiment with different kinds of writing instruments. In addition, provide different types of paper for your child to use.

This book was designed to be completed with you working with your child. This one-on-one time maximizes learning opportunities. I Can Trace! is more than just an activity book! This workbook is an opportunity for your child to learn colors, to learn how to follow directions, to develop a proper writing grip, and to build key pre-kindergarten skills. Try completing a couple of pages a day with your child.

## Safety First

Here are some tips to make your child's first tracing experiences pleasant and safe:

- Select markers, crayons, and pencils that are child-friendly. Look for a label that says "Non-Toxic and Washable."
- Some manufacturers make large crayons and colored pencils specifically for little hands. Large utensils are not a must, but they may be helpful for your child's first writing attempts.
- Remind your child that crayons, markers, and pencils are to be used on paper-not walls! (There are crayons that your child can use on shower or bathtub walls. These are a fun alternative, but make sure your child knows that they are to be used only in the shower or bath.)
- Use a large piece of paper or a vinyl tablecloth to cover the space where your child is working. This will make clean up a snap!
- Keep wipes or paper towels handy so you can wipe marker from your child's hands.
